TALL GRASS AND YARD MAINTENANCE

As we head into the warmer months, we'd like to remind residents of the importance of maintaining clean and well-kept yards in accordance with the City of Eagle Lake's code.

This includes keeping grass trimmed to a height of **NO MORE THAN 8 INCHES** and removing debris, weeds, and clutter from your property.

Overgrown grass and untidy yards not only impact the appearance of our community but can also attract pests and create safety hazards. Please take a moment to check your yard and ensure it complies with the city's regulations.

ALERT INFORMATION

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTION

Are tornado sirens meant to be heard indoors?

ANSWER

No, tornado sirens are an outdoor warning system designed to alert people who are outside that dangerous weather is approaching.

To receive alerts while indoors, consider getting a NOAA Weather Radio All Hazards. Similar to a smoke detector for severe weather, this radio will wake you up and notify you of any warnings issued in your area, so you can take the necessary precautions. Additionally, the CodeRED Emergency Notification System provides fast, customized emergency messages directly to homes, businesses, and mobile phones. CodeRED alerts include critical notifications like tornado warnings, missing child alerts, and evacuation notices. For more information on the CodeRED system, visit Blue Earth County's CodeRED page.

STORMWATER CORNER

WHY SHOULD I BE CONCERNED ABOUT STORMWATER?

Did you know? Storm drains direct water straight into our waterways—our lakes, rivers, and wetlands—bypassing any treatment facility. Any material that enters a storm sewer that is not purely stormwater is considered an "illicit discharge."

These discharges, which are pollutants, can be carried by water from spring melt or stormwater runoff, and includes but is not limited to:

- Pesticides, fertilizer, herbicide, and other lawn chemicals
- Yard waste like grass clippings and leaves
- Pet waste
- Dirt and sand
- Debris
- Motor oil
- Soapy water from washing a car at home
- And many other sources!





Illicit discharge detection and elimination (IDDE) is crucial to stop illicit discharges from polluting our receiving waters, and to maintain swimmable, fishable, and drinkable water.

HOW DO I REPORT A SUSPECTED ILLICIT DISCHARGE?

STEP 1 Observe from a safe distance. **DO NOT** touch or smell the substance.

STEP 2 Notify the Non–Emergency Police Line: 507-304-4863.

In the case of an emergency, call 9-1-1.

STEP **3** Provide the following information:

- Your name
- Phone number
- Discovery/incident time, date, and location
- Description of material, and source if known
- Estimate extent of the problem (slow trickle vs significant flow)
- Take photographs or video of the scene for subsequent investigation by City or other agencies.

As the weather warms up and spring arrives, it's important to be aware of illicit discharges, and to know how to prevent pollution. Many homeowners will be busy mowing their lawns, leading to an increase in grass clippings, yard waste, and the use of lawn chemicals. While these activities are common, it's important to manage them responsibly to prevent pollution.

HOW CAN I PREVENT POLLUTION?

Be aware of what you're putting on the ground outside. Ask yourself if that could be a source of pollution.

- Pick up litter when you happen upon it.
- Cover garbage cans, recycling bins, and truck loads to prevent unintentional litter.
- Scoop all pet poop!
- Direct grass clippings and leaves away from hard surfaces like driveways and sidewalks.
- Install native plants and rain gardens.
- Use phosphorus free fertilizer and follow all instructions.
- Fix vehicle leaks and catch drips with cardboard.
- Never dump anything down the storm drain.
- Minimize deicing salt used in the winter.

By taking simple steps such as composting yard waste and being mindful of lawn chemical usage, we can keep our community green and protect our local waterways.



DOG LICENSES

Per Eagle Lake code, all dogs within city limits must be licensed. Once licensed, please be sure that your dog wears its metal tag that is issued with the dog license. This helps the police identify where a dog lives so that it can be returned home if lost versus being impounded.



Please call or stop by City Hall to obtain a dog license application if your dog is not currently licensed.

Replacement tags are available at NO CHARGE if a tag is lost or damaged.

SUMMER SAFETY TIPS

The Blue Earth County Sheriff's Office wants to remind our citizens to make safety a priority.

We've compiled some summer safety tips to educate and remind the wonderful communities that we serve of several things to be mindful of during the summer months:

LOCK UP

- Never leave your unattended vehicle with its windows down or doors unlocked.
- Make sure to always lock up your house, garage, and storage shed.
- Bring valuables inside.

VACATION PREPARATIONS

- If you are going out of town, ask a family member or trusted neighbor to keep an eye on your house and retrieve any mail or packages that arrive.
- Make sure your home is locked up and secure.
- Set a light on a timer inside of your home to create the appearance of activity inside.
- Consider installing exterior motion sensor lighting.
- This can help deter crime.
- Keep your valuables out of plain sight and place them in a safe if possible.
- Do not post your vacation plans on social media.

CURFEW PER CITY ORDINANCE

- It is unlawful for a juvenile age twelve (12) and under to be present in a public place or establishment within Eagle Lake, any time between 9:00 p.m. and 5:00 a.m.
- It is unlawful for a juvenile age thirteen (13) through seventeen (17) to be present in any public place or establishment within Eagle Lake, any time between 11:00 p.m. and 5:00 p.m.

DRIVE SAFELY

- Always designate a sober driver. This applies to driving your car, motorcycle, boat, or anything on the road.
- Buckle up.
- Avoid distractions while driving. Put your phone down.
 Always look for pedestrians, motorcyclists, and
- bicyclists.

PRACTICE SAFE BIKE RIDING

- Check your bike to make sure the tires are inflated, and the brakes are working. Put reflectors on the front and back of your bike.
- Always wear a helmet and pads for protection.
- If you ride on the street, keep to the right and follow all traffic signs.
- Be on the lookout for traffic, yield to vehicles, and signal when turning.
- Use the crosswalks and yield to pedestrians. If you have to cross at an intersection, look both ways and walk your bike to the other side.
- Stay alert and watch out for hazards.

AVOID HEAT RELATED INJURIES OR DEATH

- Never leave kids, pets, or anyone in your care inside your unattended vehicle.
- If your kids or pets are playing outside on a hot day, be sure they drink plenty of water and find shade when they need it.

SCOOP THE POOP

WHAT'S SO BAD ABOUT DOG WASTE?

Pet waste contains harmful bacteria, parasites, and nutrients that do not belong in surface waters and can be harmful to humans as well as other pets and wildlife. Rain and melting snow carry these pollutants from yards and park areas to local creeks, ponds, and lakes. Bacteria and other parasites found in pet waste, such as Salmonella, Giardia, and Roundworms, can survive for long period when left on the ground. Reducing the amount of pet waste that ends up in our local surface waters will help improve water quality by decreasing the amount of nutrients that algae thrive on.



AND DON'T FORGET

PICK UP THE PET WASTE IN YOUR OWN YARD

No matter how cute your dog is, it is contributing to the pollution problem if you are not actively on dog 'doo-dy'. Dog owners can easily and economically manage dog waste by cleaning up after your dog. By doing so, you help keep our waters safe and aesthetically pleasing.

YOU CAN HELP

SCOUT IT

Make sure you are keeping an eye on your dog and always clean up their waste.

SCOOP IT

Always have a plastic bag with you when you are walking the dog. Use the bag as a glove to pick up the dog waste. Scoop it up and turn the bag inside out around the waste.

DISPOSE IT

Properly dispose of dog waste by putting it in a trash can.

NEVER THROW DOG WASTE DOWN A STORM DRAIN.

BUILDING AND ZONING PERMITS

Permits are required for almost all construction projects

INCLUDING BUT NOT LIMITED TO

BUILDING PERMIT

Gopher State One Call 1-800-252-1166 or 811 Protect yourselves and your property against underground utility damage and liability. Before digging, anyone in Minnesota must call Gopher State One Call (GSOC) and find out where underground utility lines might be buried (no cost).

A MESSAGE TO THE COMMUNITY

Section 4: EXCEPTIONS (A) It is an affirmative defense for a juvenile to prove that:

1. the juvenile was accompanied by his or her parent, guardian, or other responsible adult.

2. the juvenile was engaged in a lawful employment activity or was going to or returning home from his or her place of employment.

3. the juvenile was involved in an emergency situation.

4. the juvenile was going to, attending, or returning home from an official school, religious, or other recreational activity sponsored and/ or supervised by a public entity or a civic organization.

5. the juvenile was on an errand at the direction of a parent or guardian.

6. the juvenile was exercising First Amendment rights protected by the United States Constitution or Article I of the Constitution of the State of Minnesota.

7. the juvenile was engaged in interstate travel.

8. the juvenile was on the public right-of-way boulevard or sidewalk abutting the property containing the juvenile's residence or abutting the neighboring property, structure, or residence.

GOLF CART RULES

- A permit is required to operate a golf cart on the streets of the City of Eagle Lake.
- A slow moving emblem shall be displayed on all golf carts.
- Golf carts must be equipped with a rear view mirror.
- Operators of golf carts must provide driver information and provide proof of liability insurance if requested by law enforcement.
- Golf carts can only be operated on designated roadways from the hours of sunrise to sunset and may not be operated during the hours of sunset to sunrise, in inclement weather, in smoke, fog, or any other condition where visibility is impaired.
- It is unlawful to operate golf carts in parks, on sidewalks or trails.

Residents can obtain a permit application form on the City of Eagle Lake website or stop by City Hall for a hard copy of the form. Once completed, the form can be taken to the Blue Earth County Justice Center to get a permit.

CSAH 27 PEDESTRIAN CONNECTIVITY

IMPROVEMENTS PROJECT

The City of Eagle Lake is excited to announce the upcoming CSAH 27 Pedestrian Connectivity Improvements Project, set to begin in 2026. This project will enhance pedestrian and bicycle access, safety, and comfort in the southeastern part of the community by constructing a sidewalk and 10-ft-wide bituminous trail along Agency Street and 211th Street. The project, funded in part by a federal grant awarded in 2023, will also include a new pedestrian crosswalk flasher system at CSAH 27 and Thomas Drive. To prepare for final planning and design, the City has hired Bolton & Menk to conduct surveys in the project area, with utility markings indicating the location of buried lines. There will be no excavation or construction as part of this survey. The project will provide ADA-compliant infrastructure and will eliminate gaps in the sidewalk and trail network, promoting active transportation.

SOLICITOR AWARENESS & SAFETY REMINDERS

ATTENTION RESIDENTS

The City has recently received calls from residents concerned about individuals going door to door without proper authorization.

Please be aware that all solicitors must have a valid solicitor's license issued by the City of Eagle Lake.

- If you feel uncomfortable opening your door DON'T.
- Never allow someone in your home, even if they have a license.
- The City does not issue photo ID badges for solicitors. A photo badge does not indicate City approval.
- Ask to see the solicitor's license. It must be signed and display the embossed City seal.

If someone comes to your door and cannot produce this license, or if the situation feels suspicious, **contact the Blue Earth County**Sheriff's Office immediately by calling 911 or the non-emergency line at 507-304-4863.

A list of all currently approved licenses is available on the City's website under "Quick Links." Residents are encouraged to check back regularly for updates. For verification or questions, contact City Hall during business hours (Monday Friday, 7:30 a.m. – 4:30 p.m.). Please note: **the issuance of a license does not imply City endorsement** of any company or product.

Residents are also urged to **research any vendor or company** thoroughly before signing contracts or sharing personal information.

EXCEPTIONS

Licenses are not required for court-ordered sales, auctions, wholesale transactions, sales of farm/garden products, deliveries of perishable goods (like milk or bakery items) to regular customers, or solicitations by charitable, religious, fraternal, or civic organizations.

WATER TREATMENT PLANT PROGRESS

As part of our ongoing efforts to improve our community's infrastructure, the council and staff continue to work diligently on advancing the water treatment plant project. Recently, I had the opportunity to join a delegation in Washington, D.C., where we met with Congressman Finstad, Senator Klobuchar, and her staff, as well as Senator Smith's team. These conversations are vital as we seek congressional-directed funding to ensure the successful completion of this critical project.

Back here in Minnesota, Administrator Bromeland and I had the privilege of testifying in front of the House capital Investment Committee to advocate for this important initiative. We are proud to report that the project is shovel-ready, and we are eager to see it move forward to ensure clean, safe water for our residents. We will continue to work closely with our federal representatives to secure the necessary support to make this project a reality.

CHILD CARE A VITAL WORKFORCE ISSUE

Access to affordable and quality childcare remains a significant barrier to workforce participation in our community. As we work to ensure that everyone who wants to contribute to the local economy has the opportunity to do so, we recognize that affordable childcare is an essential piece of the puzzle.

There is an urgent need for increased investments to expand childcare slots, support childcare providers, and ensure the sustainability of the childcare business model. We also need to remove regulatory barriers, update outdated policies, and create incentives for businesses to support new childcare facilities and operations. These investments will directly benefit working families and strengthen our economy by enabling more parents to participate in the workforce. Our administration is committed to working alongside state and federal partners to address these issues and provide long-term solutions to the childcare crisis.

HWY 14 CORRIDOR STUDY A STEP TOWARD FUTURE IMPROVEMENTS

We're pleased to share that the **Hwy 14 Corridor Study** is nearing completion, and we expect to have important information to review in the coming weeks. This collaborative effort, led by the **Mankato Area Planning Organization (MAPO)** in partnership with **MnDOT** and local communities, is focused on planning for the future of Hwy 14, particularly in the **Eagle Lake area**.

The stretch of Hwy 14 between **County Road 12** and **Hwy 60** has long experienced various safety and mobility challenges. This study aims to identify opportunities for improvements that address these issues while ensuring that the solutions align with the community's needs and goals.

As always, thank you for your ongoing involvement and support as we work together to improve our infrastructure and ensure a safer, more efficient transportation system for everyone.

IMPROVEMENTS AROUND THE CITY

We are pleased to report that our **2025-2026 Reconstruction Project** is moving forward. This past March we held a successful open house to share details about the project with the community. HOUSING LEGISLATION
Ensuring Affordable
Housing for All

Affordable housing is a top priority for our city. As our community continues to grow, ensuring that everyone has access to safe, affordable housing is critical to maintaining a thriving, diverse neighborhood. We are tracking several bills at the state level that could influence housing policies here in Eagle Lake.

LOCAL GOVERNMENT AID (LGA) Protecting Essential City Services As many of you know, 51% of our city's budget comes from Local Government Aid (LGA). This funding is crucial for supporting the services that make our city a great place to live—from public safety and education to infrastructure and parks. We are particularly focused on LGA bills being discussed at the state level, as any changes could have a significant impact on our budget and the services we provide.
